Five-Year Cumulative Index, Volumes 1 - 5, 2011-2015 Compiled by Tom Greaves

With this issue ACCOUNTS begins its sixth year. This cumulative index covers the content of the first 5 years of ACCOUNTS articles. The five years consists of 9 issues: (1) 1-1&2: (2)2-1, (3)2-2, (4)3-1, (5)3-2, (6)4-1, (7) 4-2, (8) 5-1, (9) 5-2. The name of every individual mentioned in the articles of these nine issues, if associated with Union County, is in this index, together with mentioned place names, settlements, businesses, geographic features, activities, institutions, and industries in the county, and events that transpired in the county. The location data for each entry is of this form: 4-2:33-36. The notation means volume 4, no. 2, pages 33-36.

The most common activity Society members and visitors to its Courthouse office pursue is tracing the names and activities of family ancestors. With that in mind, this index lists every individual living in Union County who is mentioned by an author of one or more of the articles in these nine issues.

Place names, economic activities, and communities are also consistently found in this index, because they are often the subject of research undertaken by individuals, including students. Some places outside the county (e.g. Lancaster County; Stephenson County, Illinois; and Philadelphia) are also indexed where an author has linked them to important activities of individual Union Countians.

Users will find that for five towns (Lewisburg, Mifflinburg, New Berlin, Mazeppa, and Laurelton) topics and individuals associated principally with a particular town are listed under the town name. (Extending this pattern, Bucknell University entries are listed together within the Lewisburg section.) However, if an individual residing one of these towns was not so indicated by the article author, then the individual will, together with all other individuals, be listed by surname in the general alphabetical list. Thus a search for an individual associated with one of the five towns commonly will entail looking first under that town and, if not there, then in the general alphabetical list. The same applies to businesses and institutions. Married women may be listed under either their married or unmarried surname, or both.
